## **Standards for Writing**

- 1. Write opinion pieces on topics or texts, supporting a point of view with reasons and information.
  - a. Introduce a topic or text clearly, state an opinion, and create an organizational structure in which related ideas are grouped to support the writer's purpose.
  - b. Provide reasons that are supported by facts and details.
  - c. Link opinion and reasons using words and phrases (e.g., for instance, in order to, in addition).
  - d. Provide a concluding statement or section related to the opinion presented.
- 2. Write informative/explanatory texts to examine a topic and convey ideas and information clearly.
  - a. Introduce a topic clearly and group related information in paragraphs and sections; include formatting (e.g., headings), illustrations, and multimedia when useful to aiding comprehension.
  - b. Develop the topic with facts, definitions, concrete details, quotations, or other information and examples related to the topic.
  - c. Link ideas within categories of information using words and phrases (e.g., another, for example, also, because).
  - d. Provide a concluding statement or section related to the information or explanation presented.
- 3. Write narratives to develop real or imagined experiences or events using effective technique, descriptive details, and clear event sequences.
  - a. Introduce setting and characters; organize an event sequence that unfolds naturally.
  - b. Use a variety of transitional words and phrases to manage the sequence of events.
  - c. Use dress-ups and ly words.
  - d. Provide a conclusion that follows from the narrated experiences or events.
- 4. With guidance and support from adults, develop and strengthen writing as needed by planning, revising, and editing. Use technology to publish work (typing).
- 5. Conduct short research projects that build knowledge through investigation of different aspects of a topic.
- 6. Recall relevant information from experiences or gather relevant information from print and digital sources; take notes and categorize information, and provide a list of sources.
- 7. Write routinely over extended time frames (time for research, reflection, and revision) and shorter time frames (a single sitting or a day or two) for a range of discipline-specific tasks, purposes, and audiences.
